EUROPEAN OPERATIONS PLAYBOOK.



Practical guidance for freight restrictions, Amazon FC planning and cross-border fulfillment.

August LANDSCAPE

August combines public holidays, summer freight restrictions, carrier capacity changes and warehouse receiving pressure across different markets. While each event is local, their operational effects often extend beyond national borders, influencing **inventory movement, Amazon FC appointments and cross-border fulfillment planning** throughout the month.



WHY THIS MATTERS?

CONNECTED OPERATIONS

European fulfillment networks continue operating across borders even when individual countries follow different holiday calendars.

COMPRESSED TRANSPORT WINDOWS

Weekend restrictions and public holidays reduce available freight capacity, making inbound planning less flexible.

WAREHOUSE COORDINATION

Transport delays can influence warehouse receiving schedules and Amazon FC appointments, even when inventory reaches the destination country on time.



HOW OPERATIONAL RISK DEVELOPS ACROSS EUROPE?

CROSS-BORDER EFFECTS

I

Operational pressure rarely remains within one country. A public holiday, freight restriction or carrier disruption in one market can influence transport schedules, warehouse receiving and inventory availability across neighbouring countries.

II

ROLLING RISK

August creates several operational windows throughout the month. As holidays, freight restrictions and carrier capacity evolve, each period requires different planning priorities to maintain reliable inbound execution.

RECEIVING PRESSURE

III

Even when transport resumes, warehouse receiving and Amazon FC appointments may recover at a different pace. As a result, inventory availability may lag behind transport arrivals.

IV

EARLY PLANNING

Available carrier options, receiving windows and appointment flexibility become more limited once peak operational periods begin. Decisions made before each high-risk week typically preserve more routing options than decisions made during disruption.

OPERATIONAL VISIBILITY

V

Understanding where restrictions overlap, which markets are affected and when operational pressure is likely to increase allows teams to position inventory, confirm appointments and coordinate inbound movements.

WEEKLY OPERATIONAL OUTLOOK

Week	Operational Focus	Risk
Week 1 (1–9 Aug)	Summer freight restrictions continues across several markets. Confirm transport schedules and review inbound plans before weekend capacity tightens.	● High
Week 2 (10–16 Aug)	PPWR application, Ferragosto, Assumption Day and regional traffic restrictions create the highest operational pressure of the month.	● Very High
Week 3 (17–23 Aug)	Freight recovers, but warehouse receiving and Amazon FC appointments may remain under pressure as delayed inventory moves through the network.	● High
Week 4 (24–31 Aug)	Month-end replenishment, remaining restrictions and UK bank holiday preparations influence September inventory planning.	● Moderate

MARKET RISK SNAPSHOT

ITALY

Highest operational pressure driven by Ferragosto and extensive summer freight restrictions.

FRANCE

Nationwide HGV restrictions and holiday periods influence cross-border freight and replenishment timing.

GERMANY

Saturday truck bans continue to affect transport flexibility on selected routes.

POLAND

Generally stable operations, although regional staffing and cross-border dependencies should still be considered.

Early Preparation

WEEK 1



WHAT'S HAPPENING

The first week of August provides an opportunity to **prepare before operational pressure reaches its peak**. Existing freight restrictions, ongoing carrier adjustments and the first full month under the EUR 3 duty create a **planning window** before the month's busiest operational period arrives.

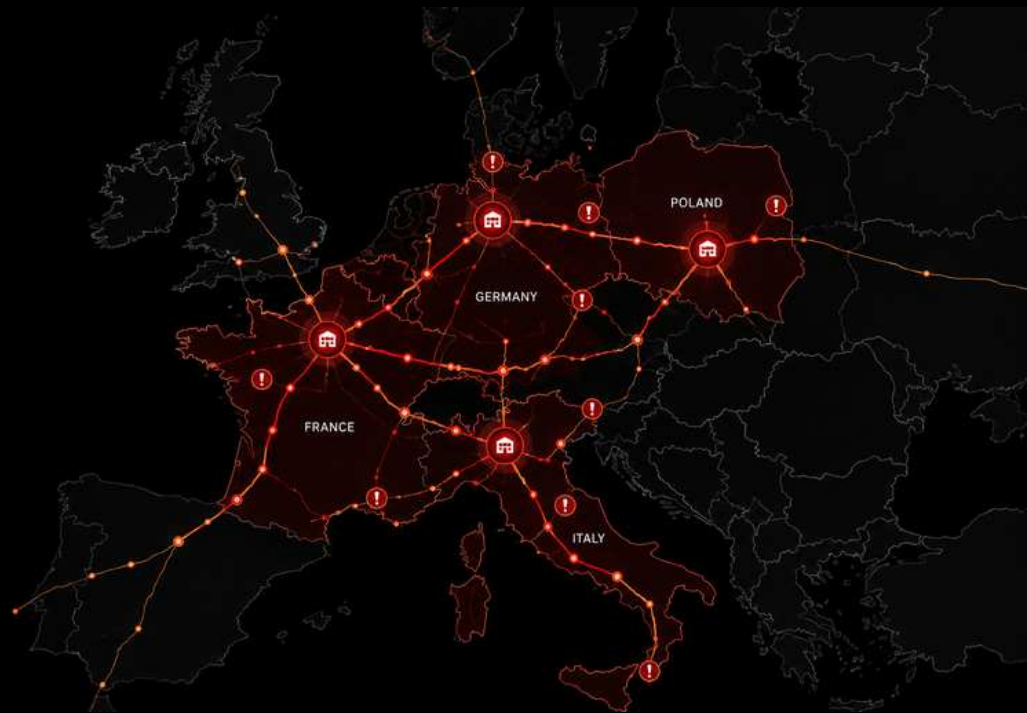
OPERATIONAL IMPACT

The operational challenge during the first week is **preserving flexibility**. Confirmed transport schedules, receiving capacity and inbound priorities established now reduce the need for reactive decisions once August's highest-risk operational window begins.

WHAT OPERATIONS TEAMS SHOULD DO

- Confirm transport schedules before weekend restrictions reduce available departure windows.
- Review inbound plans for shipments expected to arrive during mid-August.
- Separate customs-related exceptions from transport constraints when assessing delays.
- Reserve additional flexibility before operational pressure increases later in the month.

Peak Pressure WEEK 2



WHAT'S HAPPENING

The second week represents August's highest operational pressure. **PPWR** begins applying on 12 August, **Ferragosto and Assumption Day** affect multiple European markets, and freight restrictions continue across key transport corridors. Several operational events overlap, reducing flexibility for transport, warehouse receiving and inbound coordination.

OPERATIONAL IMPACT

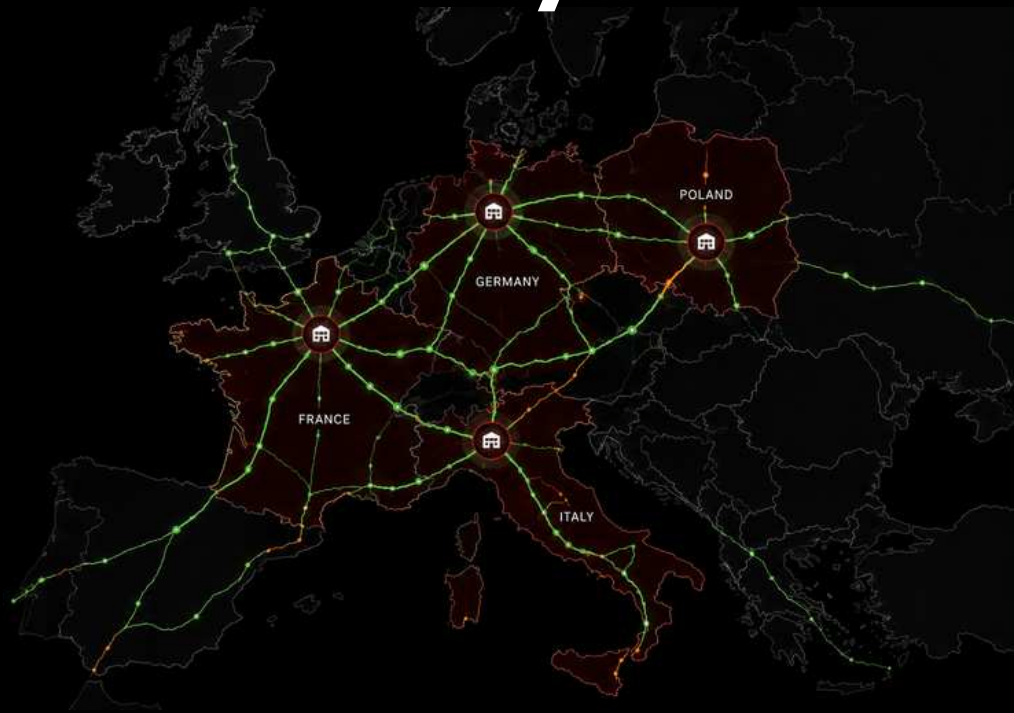
Operational pressure is driven by **individual events` combined effect**. Transport schedules, warehouse receiving capacity and Amazon FC appointments become increasingly interconnected, leaving fewer opportunities to recover from delayed departures or last-minute planning changes.

WHAT OPERATIONS TEAMS SHOULD DO

- Confirm warehouse receiving windows before dispatching inventory.
- Prioritise time-sensitive replenishment over routine stock movements.
- Maintain contingency options for shipments requiring schedule changes.
- Monitor cross-border dependencies rather than evaluating each market independently.
- Verify carrier schedules before committing inventory to fixed receiving appointments.

Controlled Recovery

WEEK 3



WHAT'S HAPPENING

As major holiday periods begin ending across Europe, **transport activity gradually stabilises**. However, warehouses, carriers and Amazon fulfillment centers recover at different speeds, while **inventory delayed during the previous weeks continues moving through the network**.

OPERATIONAL IMPACT

The operational challenge shifts **from capacity constraints to network synchronisation**. Shipments may reach their destination while warehouse receiving, Amazon FC appointments or inventory availability may recover on different timelines.

WHAT OPERATIONS TEAMS SHOULD DO

- Prioritise inventory supporting upcoming customer demand.
- Review warehouse receiving capacity before accelerating inbound deliveries.
- Monitor inventory availability rather than transport completion alone.
- Reassess replenishment priorities as operating conditions stabilise.
- Identify shipments requiring proactive follow-up before releasing additional inventory.

September Readiness

WEEK 4



WHAT'S HAPPENING

The final week of August marks the **transition to September planning**. While some regional restrictions remain in place, operational attention shifts towards month-end replenishment, early September inventory positioning and maintaining continuity across European fulfillment networks.

OPERATIONAL IMPACT

Operational pressure gradually decreases, but **planning responsibility increases**. Decisions made during the final week influence inventory availability, warehouse workloads and transport capacity during the opening weeks of September.

WHAT OPERATIONS TEAMS SHOULD DO

- Complete outstanding August replenishment before month-end.
- Confirm transport schedules supporting early September inventory arrivals.
- Review inventory positioning across European markets.
- Validate warehouse capacity for planned September inbound deliveries.
- Capture operational lessons from August before finalising September plans.

Market INSIGHTS



THE WAY AUGUST MOVES ACROSS EUROPE

During August, **different regions** experience changing transport conditions, public holidays and freight restrictions at **different points throughout the month**. While some markets enter their busiest operating windows, others continue supporting inventory movement, warehouse receiving and cross-border fulfillment.

For operations teams, the challenge is understanding where pressure develops next. Planning decisions made before local constraints begin affecting transport and warehouse capacity help preserve flexibility across the wider European network.

REGIONAL OVERVIEW

SOUTHERN EUROPE

The highest concentration of August-specific freight restrictions and seasonal transport pressure.

WESTERN EUROPE

Cross-border inventory movements increasingly reflect changing transport and warehouse conditions.

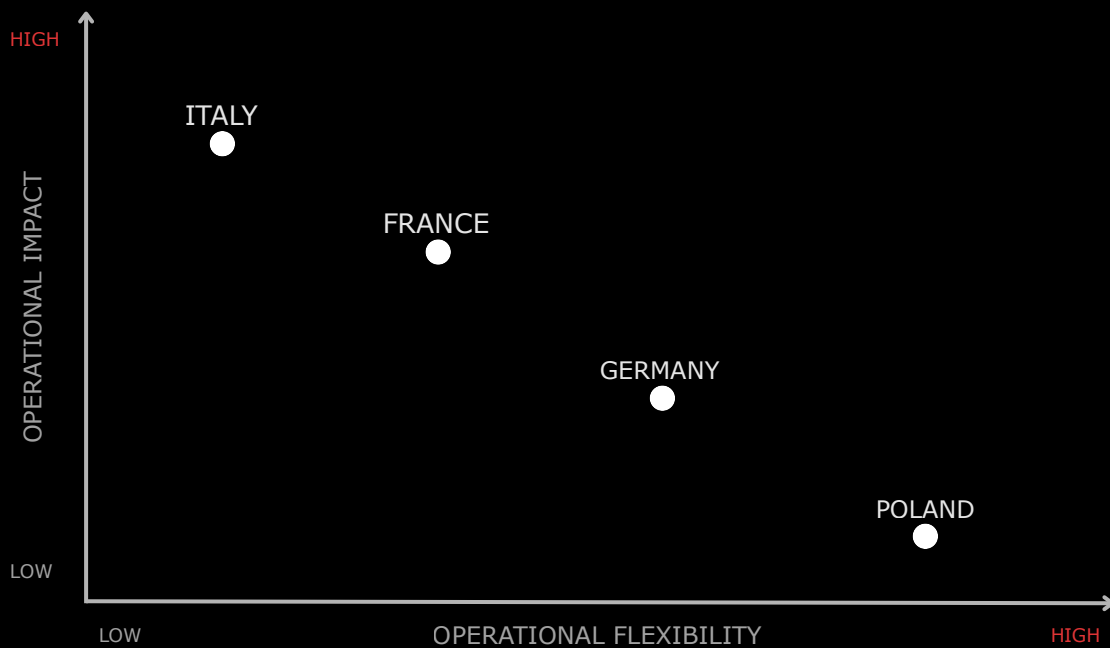
CENTRAL EUROPE

Major logistics hubs continue supporting inventory movement and distribution across European markets.

NORTHERN & OTHER

Fewer local constraints, while remaining connected to inventory and transport flows from higher-pressure regions.

MARKETS REQUIRING THE GREATEST ATTENTION



The August Risk Matrix compares four European markets using two operational dimensions.

Operational Impact reflects how significantly country-specific events may affect transport, warehouse operations and fulfillment execution without advance planning.

Operational Flexibility indicates how much room operations teams typically retain to adjust transport schedules, receiving capacity and inbound decisions as August progresses.

Higher positions on the matrix indicate earlier planning requirements and closer operational coordination. Greater operational flexibility is generally found towards the right side of the matrix, even when August conditions become more demanding.

Restricted Windows

ITALY

OPERATIONAL ROLE

Italy is a key Southern European market where August requires the earliest inbound coordination. Reduced transport flexibility makes planning decisions more time-sensitive than in most other European markets.



AUGUST FOCUS

Ferragosto, weekend HGV restrictions and reduced operating capacity compress transport and receiving windows, making inbound planning significantly less flexible throughout the month.

RECOMMENDED ACTIONS

Confirm priority inbound before restricted periods begin, secure receiving capacity early and maintain enough transport flexibility to respond as operating conditions change.

WHAT TO WATCH

- Ferragosto operating window;
- Weekend HGV restrictions;
- Amazon FC appointment availability;
- Reduced carrier flexibility.

Network Dependencies

FRANCE

OPERATIONAL ROLE

France is one of Europe's largest e-commerce markets, where inventory positioning and cross-border fulfillment frequently depend on coordinated transport and warehouse operations across neighbouring European countries.



AUGUST FOCUS

Summer holidays, Assumption Day and changing carrier availability increase reliance on coordinated transport planning while reducing flexibility for inbound scheduling.

RECOMMENDED ACTIONS

Position inventory ahead of peak holiday periods, confirm receiving capacity early and maintain visibility across cross-border transport movements.

WHAT TO WATCH

- Assumption Day operations;
- Carrier capacity changes;
- Cross-border transport flows;
- Warehouse receiving windows.

Strategic Hub

GERMANY

OPERATIONAL ROLE

Germany serves as Europe's primary logistics hub, supporting inventory distribution, cross-border fulfillment and transport connections across multiple markets. Operational decisions made here frequently influence fulfillment performance beyond Germany itself.



AUGUST FOCUS

Summer truck restrictions, high freight volumes and continuous cross-border movements require proactive coordination to maintain reliable inbound and distribution throughout August.

RECOMMENDED ACTIONS

Confirm transport schedules early, protect key receiving windows and maintain routing flexibility as network capacity shifts across Europe.

WHAT TO WATCH

- Saturday truck restrictions;
- Cross-border freight flows;
- Warehouse receiving capacity;
- Transport routing flexibility.

Regional Support

POLAND

OPERATIONAL ROLE

Poland supports regional inventory distribution and cross-border fulfillment while providing operational flexibility within the wider European network. Throughout August, it often helps maintain stable inventory flows as pressure increases across neighbouring markets.



AUGUST FOCUS

Compared with many European markets, August remains operationally stable despite Assumption Day and seasonal staffing changes affecting selected transport and warehouse activities.

RECOMMENDED ACTIONS

Maintain regular inbound planning, monitor regional transport developments and use available operational flexibility to support wider European inventory movements.

WHAT TO WATCH

- Assumption Day operations
- Regional transport changes
- Cross-border inventory flows
- Warehouse capacity levels

Planning FRAMEWORK

PLAN

- ✓ Review country-specific restrictions.
- ✓ Secure warehouse capacity for critical inbound.
- ✓ Confirm Amazon FC appointments.

MONITOR

- ✓ Track weekly operational changes across European markets.
- ✓ Monitor carrier updates and potential transport disruptions.
- ✓ Verify warehouse receiving progress against arrivals.

ADAPT

- ✓ Prioritise time-sensitive replenishment.
- ✓ Adjust transport plans when operating conditions change.
- ✓ Reallocate inventory to protect customer availability.

PREPARE

- ✓ Position inventory to support early September demand.
- ✓ Confirm September inbound bookings.
- ✓ Document August operational insights for future planning.
